This course explores the effect of information technology on language teaching methodology. A broad range of computer-assisted language learning software is pedagogically and philosophically evaluated and extensive training is given in authoring CALL resources for teaching listening, speaking, reading, writing, vocabulary, and grammar.

A- Aims: The course aims first to provide students with theoretical knowledge of the role of computer technology in language learning and second to apprise them of current computer applications available for English language teaching.

7. read and analyze studies on CALL to understand current and future areas of interest in this field
8. work as groups to develop (if possible) computer applications for ELT
