Course Objectives:

Syntax II is an advanced course that deals primarily with complex, compound, and compound- complex sentences. It incorporates a detailed description of nominal, adverbial and adjectival clauses. Upon completing the course, students should be able to:

- 1. Identify complex and compound sentences
- 2. Describe nominal, adverbial and adjectival clauses in term of type, structure, and transformations that operate on them.
- 3. Identify clause coordinators and subordinators, and use them correctly.
- 4. Show reasonable awareness of clausal ellipsis and use ellipted clauses correctly.
- 5. Analyze complex, compound, and compound-complex sentences into their constituents showing the grammatical functions of such constituents.
