Course Title: The English Novel Course Code: 2201701

Credit hours: 3 Prerequisite: None

Course Description:

This course looks at the eighteenth, nineteenth and twentieth century English

novel in terms of historical context and literary technique. The novels have been

selected, not only because they are among the greatest English novels of their time but

also because they provide a coherent illustration of the development of the genre

itself. Each novel will be subject to close critical appraisal and analysis in it its own

right. As the course progresses, however, each novel will then be considered in

relation to its predecessors. Through comparison and contrast students will become

aware of the different fictional techniques and styles, and will become involved in a

general consideration of the art and nature of narrative and the changes that the novel

has undergone in the past three centuries or more.

Course Objectives:

By the end of the semester the general discussion topics will have included:

narrator's voice, point of view, manipulation of reader's response, narrative technique

and style, gender, ethnicity, hybridity, assimilation, symbolism, realism, modernism,

postmodernism, and postcolonialism. Literary style and form will be seen in relation

to social and historical conditions including: the Industrial Revolution, the Two Great

Wars, and changes in the class system and the role of women.

Teaching System:

Teaching will be conducted mainly through seminar discussion. It is expected that

everyone will participate fully. There will be short introductory lectures throughout

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the semester in order to provide the social, historical, literary and biographical background to each text.

Grading Policy:

Midterm exam: 30 points; class presentation and attendance: 10 points; term paper: 20 points; final exam: 40 points.
