20 Course Description:

This course is primarily concerned with the function of stylistics in facilitating literary response and in understanding the techniques and features of a variety of texts drawn from such areas of English performance as literature, the media and narrative and forensic linguistics (language and the law). Abroad selection of topics central to contemporary linguistics will be discussed especially those that are particularly illuminating in textual analysis. Selected literary works that have proved to be of considerable interest in literary criticism will be used as basis for discussion in class. Attention is given to both literary and linguistic stylistics with a view to exploring the relation between style and literary function. By the end of the course, students acquire an understanding of the principles of stylistic analysis and theory. They will be equipped with a clear understanding of how language works, how to identify the essence of an author's style and how ads win people over.

- 6. Design and conduct linguistic research, interpreting its results, demonstrating the ability to write a master's thesis proficiently, and producing reports of publishable quality.
- 7. Prepare and deliver professional and specialized seminars, and work efficiently both independently and collaboratively while upholding social and professional responsibilities.
- 8. Demonstrates proficiency in using information and communication technology, employing it to generate new knowledge and enhance intellectual and professional capabilities and skills.
