## 20 Course Description:

As stated in the approved study plan.

The purpose of this course is to provide the students with a first comprehensive view into the German-language literature of the past epochs.

What were the topics of the people from the Middle Ages till the end of the 19<sup>th</sup> Century? What worries did they have? How did they see themselves in the midst of chaotic events, of which humanity was repeatedly shaken? Is there something universally human, which is valid as it is today? These are only a few questions, according to whose answers we will look in the literary texts.

In addition to the theoretical knowledge about the development of German-language literature through epochs, the students should continue to develop and consolidate their linguistic competence. Discussions about the read, oral and written interpretations are integral parts of the desired communicative teaching.
