#### 19. Course Description:

As stated in the approved study plan.

The main objective of this course is to introduce French majors to 16th and 17th century's French literature. The movements of Romanticism, Realism and Naturalism.

This course shall cover briefly the basic skills required to effectively stage-manage a theatre production and a play making. Students will learn the role and responsibilities of a Stage Manager prior to and during the rehearsal process and during performances. Students will also learn text analysis in the pre-production preparation process.
