#### **English Sociolinguistics**

Description: Students study the mutual relationship between English and its native-speaking community. The running theme of the course is variation in English by region, social class, ethnicity, gender, and topic or genre or register. The social variety enjoying overt prestige is the standard dialect. Non-standard dialects are the bonds and symbols of local and group affiliation.
