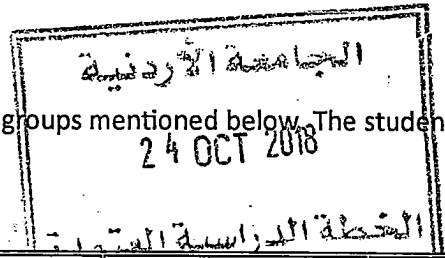

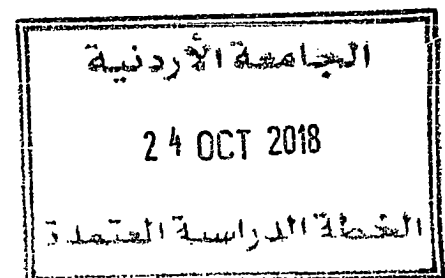

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Description of the Courses offered by the Department of French

**2202099 Intensive French (6 non-credit hours)**

*At the end of the second semester the first year students can take the French Proficiency Test (FPT). Those who pass the test should be able to follow the second year courses which will be taught entirely in French. Those who do not pass the test or opt not to take it take Intensive French which is meant to fill the gap between first year general language courses and second year more specialized courses. In Intensive French the student has to acquire the language proficiency to be able to follow the second year courses. For this reason, Intensive French will focus on listening and speaking. The student must have passed the Proficiency Test or Intensive French as a prerequisite for Listening and Reading Comprehension I (2242213) and Oral Skills (2232217).*

**2202101 French for Beginners I (3 credit hours)**

In this course, the students acquire the four language skills: listening comprehension, reading, writing and oral skills. It covers the following fields: greeting, introducing oneself, asking for a vacation, buying tickets, specifying time and place, in addition to basic grammar issues: present tense of most verbs, definite and indefinite articles, negation, gender, possessive pronouns and numbers.

**2202102 French for Beginners II (3 credit hours)**

**P. R.: 2202101 French for Beginners I**

In this course, the language is taught in depth. *French for Beginners II* develops the skills acquired in *French for Beginners I*, i. e. listening comprehension, reading, writing and oral skills. It covers other new fields such as inviting, describing one's home, giving one's opinion, describing people's appearance and personality and the weather. In addition, new grammatical issues will be covered, such as past tenses, future tense and pronouns.

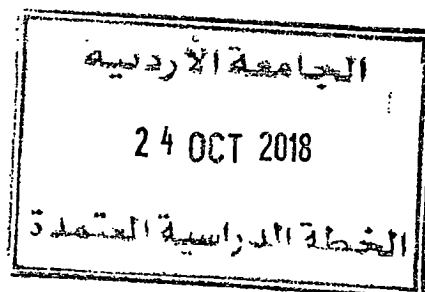
**2202103 French for Specialization I (6 credit hours)**

*This course is based on a textbook that enhances the main skills of listening comprehension, reading, writing and oral skills. French for Specialization I covers the following grammatical content: present tense, the main rules concerning nouns and adjectives, possessive pronouns, numbers, negation, prepositions, demonstrative, relative and personal pronouns. Part of the course is taught in the lab.*

**2202104 French for Specialization II (6 credit hours)**

**P.R : 2202103 French for Specialization I**

*This course focuses on the basic skills in French: Listening comprehension, reading, writing and oral skills. French for Specialization II covers the following grammatical content: past tense (passé composé/imparfait), future, conditionnel, imperative and indirect speech. Part of the course is taught in the lab.*



**2232105 Language Skills I (French)**

*This course is to be taken during the same semester as French for Specialization I. It aims at improving pronunciation and additionally focuses on the grammatical skills discussed in French for Specialization I through the use of additional exercises. Moreover, this course focuses on dictation and the four language skills.*

**2202106 Language Skills II (French)**

**(3 credit hours)**

**P.R : 2202103 French for Specialization I**

*This course is to be taken during the same semester as French for Specialization II. It aims at improving pronunciation and additionally focuses on the grammatical skills discussed in French for Specialization II through the use of additional exercises. Moreover, this course focuses on dictation and the four language skills.*

**2202107 French for Beginners III**

**(3 credit hours)**

**P. R.: 2202102 French for Beginners II**

*In this course, the language is taught more in depth; French for Beginners III develops the skills acquired in French for Beginners I and II, i. e. listening comprehension, reading, writing and oral skill. It covers other new fields such as asking for one's way, explaining the way to someone, giving orders, advices, ordering in a restaurant, comparing, expressing quantity, expressing one's wishes, proposing something, judging, defining, etc. In addition, new grammatical issues will be covered, such as the imperative, ordinal numbers, the conditional, the subjunctive and relative pronouns.*

**2232211 French Grammar I**

**(3 credit hours)**

**P.R : 2202104 French for Specialization II**

*This course provides students with the basic rules of French grammar, which will be studied systematically. It covers the compound tenses, the passive voice, the order of several personal pronouns in the sentence, the indirect speech and the indefinite adjectives and pronouns.*

**2232212 Writing I (French)**

**(3 credit hours)**

**P.R : 2202104 French for Specialization II.**

*In this course students learn how to write simple texts like personal letters, formal letters, petitions and short stories, by imitating models of texts. They will make practical writing exercises in class.*

**2242213 Listening & Reading Comprehension I (French)**

**(3 credit hours)**

**P.R : Passing 2202098 French Proficiency Test or 2202099 French Intensive**

*This course improves the comprehension skill by using different oral tools containing conversations dealing with different subjects of French life in the lab. This will help the students to get used to ways of expressing themselves in different situations and to improve their pronunciation. Furthermore, the*

*course aims to give the student the necessary skills to understand authentic written texts, to enrich his vocabulary and to teach him to understand texts globally.*

**2232214 French Grammar II (3 credit hours)**

**P. R. : 2232211 French Grammar I**

*This course provides students with the basic rules of French grammar. It covers the passé simple and the other past tenses, possessive and relative pronouns, gerund and participles and nominalization.*

**2232215 Writing II (French) (3 credit hours)**

**P. R. : 2232212 Writing I (French)**

*This course teaches how to analyze, to think logically, to organize ideas in a text and to express oneself clearly. It also teaches students how to summarize texts. They will make practical writing exercises.*

**2242216 Listening and Reading Comprehension II (French) (3 credit hours)**

**P. R. : 2242213 Listening & Reading Comprehension I (French)**

*By using tapes of an advanced level of language, this course improves the comprehension of oral French texts in the different situations of life. Furthermore, the course aims to give the student the necessary skills to understand authentic written texts, to enrich his vocabulary and to teach him to understand texts globally.*

**2232217 Oral Skills (French) (3 credit hours)**

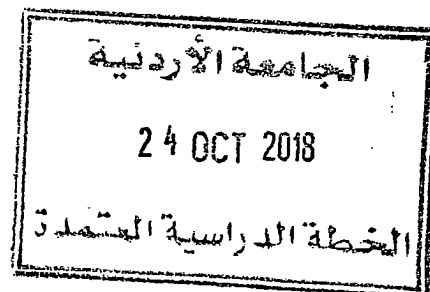
**P.R : Passing 2202098 French Proficiency Test or 2202099 French Intensive**

*This course develops speaking skills by the means of different and interesting activities. Vital subjects will be discussed, allowing students to practice how to express their personal opinions and enabling them to improve their ability of discussion in French.*

**2232218 French for Specialization III (3 credit hours)**

**P.R : 2202104 French for Specialization II**

*This course insists on the basic skills in French: Listening comprehension, reading, writing and oral skills. French for Specialization III covers the following grammatical content: revision of the different past tenses, systematization of the subjunctive, comparison and conditional clauses. Part of the course is taught in the lab.*



**2202310 Professional and Technical Writing (French) (3 credit hours)**

**P.R. : 2232212 Writing I (French)**

This course teaches a register of written communication suitable for a professional workplace environment. It provides students with the core transferrable skills that they need to build a successful career in a variety of communication sectors. Building on foundational skills such as reporting, drafting, editing, research and project management, students will become proficient at tasks in demand in today's workplaces. The student will learn how to write articles and essays to convey information to readers within a workplace context.

**2232311 Translation I (French) (3 credit hours)**

**P.R. : 2232214 French Grammar II**

The course provides students with the skills of translating from French into idiomatic and correct Arabic, and vice versa and makes them practice. This is done through authentic and varied texts written in French and Arabic (journalistic, cultural, scientific, etc.). The student is taught how to avoid literal translation while concentrating on the comprehension of the source language.

**2232312 Translation II (French) (3 credit hours)**

**P. R. : 2232311 Translation I (French)**

This course enables the student to translate authentic varied texts (journalistic, scientific, cultural, etc.) from Arabic into French. It focuses on the vocabulary and structures of each field. Writing in French should be clear avoiding literal translation.

**2232313 Advanced Writing (French) (3 credit hours)**

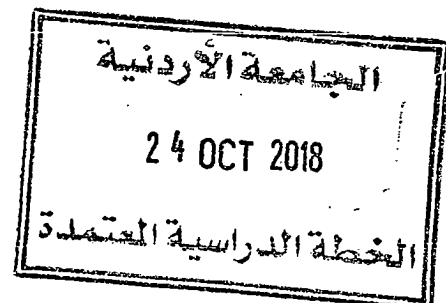
**P. R. : 2232215 Writing II (French)**

After Writing I and Writing II, students are expected to write short texts in simple and clear French. In Advanced Writing, we move to a higher level; students learn to express their ideas, to discuss, comment and criticize different ideas. They learn how to write articles and essays and apply what they have learned.

**2232314 French in the Field of Business (3 credit hours)**

**P.R.: 2232214 French Grammar II**

This course teaches the language (vocabulary and structures) used in the field of business. Written and oral texts and dialogues reflecting everyday business situations are used. It teaches students how to write business letters and teaches the principles of book keeping and business administration through case studies. Students apply what they have learned by practical exercises.



**2232315 French for Tourism (3 credit hours)**

**P.R.: 2232217 Oral Skills (French)**

*This course teaches vocabulary and professional skills in the field of tourism. By doing practical exercises, the student improves his written and oral language and learns necessary skills for the different professions in the field of tourism.*

**2202316 French in the Field of Law (3 credit hours)**

**P.R.: 2232217 Oral Skills (French)**

*This course teaches French vocabulary and terminology used in a legal workplace environment. It helps students to acquire all the foundational skills and knowledge in the judicial field connected to French and European institutions. The students will learn writing and the analysis of legal texts, with the objective of polishing their linguistic abilities to distinguish between general and specific texts, and to benefit from a number of issues that have a connection to law and the judicial field.*

**2202318 French for Diplomacy and International Relations (3 credit hours)**

**P.R.: 2232311 Translation I (French)**

*This course allows learning French in the context of Diplomacy and International Relations (European institutions, international organizations, non-governmental organizations, national and regional institutions). It is not aimed only for students of the French language department, but also for students of Law, Public Administration or Political Science. This course is a tool that can be employed for their activities in the future. It teaches students to use French to debate and to put forward ideas in a civilized manner using communication strategies. It covers a wide range of linguistic registers and vocabulary.*

**2232321 Analysis of Literary Texts (French) (3 credit hours)**

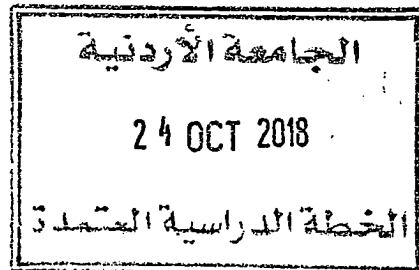
**P.R.: 2232217 Oral Skills (French)**

*This course is the first in French Literature. It provides the students with the necessary means for literary analysis. The characteristics of the literary texts in general will be discussed as well as those of the different literary genres, in particular. The student will get to know the important stylistic devices and techniques and how to recognize them.*

**2202322 French Literature I (3 credit hours)**

**P. R. : 2232321 Analysis of Literary Texts**

*This course deals with French literature from its beginnings until 17<sup>th</sup> century. It will briefly present French history of this period, focus on the renewal of the 16<sup>th</sup> century and then concentrate on classical literature of the 17<sup>th</sup> century by studying representative literary extracts.*



**2242323 Contemporary French Culture I (3 credit hours)**

**P.R.: 2232217 Oral Skills (French)**

*The course introduces French culture through different kinds of texts chosen in the French press, advertising, films, etc., which show French society, its daily life, problems of the young and of the elder generation, women's issues, the situation of foreigners in France and the demographic evolution. The students will write and present a research paper in the field of contemporary French culture; the grade of the paper will be included in the final evaluation.*

**2232325 Contemporary French Culture II (3 credit hours)**

**P. R.: 2242323 Contemporary French Culture I**

*This course aims at thoroughly examining various aspects of French culture and focusing on different political, educational, and administrative institutions. It uses various documents, such as films, French media, and books on French culture. In the course the students analyze the cultural differences between Jordan and France by placing each of them in its socio-political and geographical context. The students will prepare a research paper on contemporary French culture, and the grade of the paper will be included in the final evaluation.*

**2202326 Aspects of Social and Economic Life in France (3 credit hours)**

**P. R.: 2242323 Contemporary French Culture I**

*This course aims to examine various economic and social aspects in French society. It will use different types of sources, such as the print press, films and academic studies. Students will be asked to undertake research on a specific topic in this field and they will present it in class.*

**2242331 French Linguistics I (3 credit hours)**

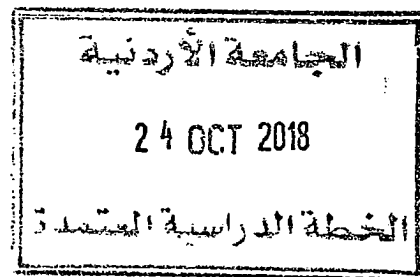
**P. R. : 2232214 French Grammar II**

*This course introduces French linguistics, its different branches and terminology. It encourages students to think about language, its nature and functions while insisting on phonetic, syntactic and lexical characteristics of French and their usage.*

**2232332 French Syntax (3 credit hours)**

**P. R. : 2232214 French Grammar II**

*This course helps the student to pass gradually from the short to the long text by concentrating on the complex sentence (relation of time, cause, effect, concession, etc.), that guarantees the coherence of any text. It will help the student to improve his competence in writing.*





**2232411 Presentation and Debating (French) (3 credit hours)**

**P. R.:2232217 Oral Skills (French)**

*This course helps students to become active speech communicators and critical listeners. Students will learn and practice how to speak confidently and enthusiastically and how to be motivating and persuasive on the platform. Creative training techniques and methods of reasoning will be examined, studied and practiced in depth. Some appropriate written and audio-visual material is to be used.*

**2202412 Essentials of Professional Communication (3 credit hours)**

**P. R.:2232217 Oral Skills (French)**

The main objective of this course is to improve the ability of students to dialogue and debate in the French language, and to present arguments in support of or against a given issue in order to persuade an audience or a group of judges.

**2202413 Special Subject in Translation (3 credit hours)**

**P.R.: 2232311 Translation I (French)**

A special subject in translation that is not covered by the study plan will be studied and practiced in some detail and depth. The exact content of the course will be defined in the course description distributed to the students at the beginning of the semester.

**2202414 French for Journalism (3 credit hours)**

**P.R.: 2232312 Translation II (French)**

The aim of this course is to train students in techniques of writing press and radio releases and how to monitor the televised news and the daily read newspapers. It also develops skills in conducting and editing interviews and news coverage.

**2232421 French Literature II (3 credit hours)**

**P. R.: 2232321 Analysis of Literary Texts (French)**

*The course deals with the period of Enlightenment (18<sup>th</sup> century) and the important literary movements of 19<sup>th</sup> century: Romanticism, Realism, Naturalism and Symbolism. After a historical introduction to each period, representative literary extracts of each movement will be studied. The students will apply the taught theories in this course on external texts.*

**2232422 French Literature III (3 credit hours)**

**P. R.: 2232321 Analysis of Literary Texts (French)**

*This course presents the leading tendencies of 20<sup>th</sup> century French literature, considering the different genres, the new intellectual ideas and the search for new forms. These different aspects will be studied by analyzing representative literary extracts. The students will apply the taught theories in this course on external texts.*

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**2202423 Contemporary French and Francophone Literature (3 credit hours)**

**P. R.: 2232321 Analysis of Literary Texts (French)**

*This course presents the leading tendencies of 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> century French and Francophone literature, considering the different genres, the new intellectual ideas and the search for new forms. These different aspects will be studied by analyzing representative literary extracts. The students will read and study at least one comprehensive work. And they will apply the taught theories on external texts.*

**2202424 Jordan through History (in French) (3 credit hours)**

**P.R.: 2242216 Listening & Reading Comprehension II (French)**

*This course studies the ancient and modern history of Jordan in French to give the student the historical knowledge he needs as a tourist guide. It is given at the same time as a language course proposing exercises where the student has to use the historical information he studies.*

**2232425 Special Subject in French Literature (3 credit hours)**

**P.R.: 2232321 Analysis of Literary Texts (French)**

*This course is a detailed and in-depth study of a special subject in literature that has not been covered by the study plan. The course content is described in the course plan and distributed to the students at the beginning of the semester. The students will apply the taught theories in this course on external texts.*

**2242431 French Linguistics II (3 credit hours)**

**P. R. : 2232214 French Grammar II**

*This course provides a more intensive application of the knowledge acquired in French Linguistics I. It focuses, through practical exercises, on lexicology, semantics and pragmatics of French.*

**2232432 Special Subject in French Language (3 credit hours)**

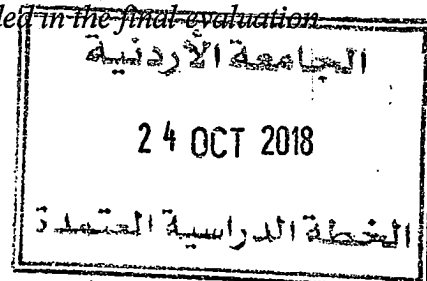
**P. R. : 2232214 French Grammar II**

*A special subject in language that is not covered by the study plan will be studied in some detail and depth. The exact content of the course will be defined in the course description distributed to the students at the beginning of the semester.*

**2232433 Teaching French as a Foreign Language (3 credit hours)**

**P.R.: 2232217 Oral Skills (French)**

*This course provides students with the main approaches in teaching French as a foreign language, especially the communicative approach. It focuses on the analysis of the text books used in the Jordanian schools where French is taught. The course requirements include an internship in a school, and the grade given for the internship report will be included in the final evaluation.*



**2202434 Evaluation (French)**

**(3 credit hours)**

**P.R.: 2242216 Listening & Reading Comprehension II (French)**

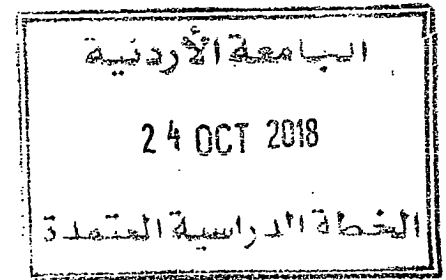
*In this course, students learn to understand and develop tests to assess language skills in French, in reading, writing, listening and speaking. The course also familiarizes students with French language proficiency certificates such as DELF (Elementary certificate in French Language) and DALF (Advanced Certificate in French Language). The course requirements include an internship in a school; and the grade given for the internship report will be included in the final evaluation.*

**2202490 Field Training**

**(3 credit hours)**

**P.R.: Completion of 90 credit hours**

The course provides prospective graduates with training in public & private sectors as well as organizations inside and outside the country for the purpose of enhancing their linguistic and communicative skills. Training is supervised by experienced professionals in such organization as well as faculty members from the department.



### Description of the Specialization Requirements in English

**2201111 Introduction to English Literature (3 credit hours)**

This course is an introduction to samples from literature written in English in the three basic genres of poetry, drama and fiction in addition to prose essays. It should focus on the formal and linguistic aspects of the literary work, and should also discuss its intellectual content.

**2201114 Writing (3 credit hours)**

This course aims at developing students' ability to write correct, cohesive, and organized paragraphs and short essays of different rhetorical types, e.g., expository, descriptive, argumentative, etc.

**2201120 English Grammar (3 credit hours)**

This course aims at acquainting students with the structure of simple sentences. Students are trained on how to analyze sentences into their constituents in terms of categories and functions. The course gives special attention to sentence types: simple, compound, and complex.

**2201215 Essentials of Public Speaking (3 credit hours)**

The course aims at training students to develop self-confidence, use appropriate body language when speaking in public. It also trains them to speak both impromptu and from notes. Two genres of speech are emphasized: the informative and the persuasive.

**2201216 Professional Writing (3 credit hours)**

**P.R.: 2201114 Writing**

The course aims at developing the student's skills in producing texts of different genres, e.g., curriculum vitae, memos, minutes, cover letters and application forms, correspondence: acceptance, rejection, complaint, etc.

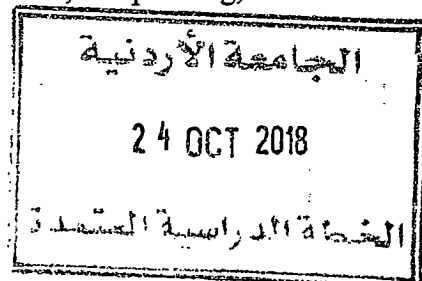
**2201251 Short Story (3 credit hours)**

**P.R.: 2201111 Introduction to English Literature**

This course aims at introducing students to the genre of the short story through tracing its origins and its development from 1840 to the present times. To achieve its purposes, the course selects some twenty stories, beginning with the pioneers of the genre, like Poe, Turgenev, Maupassant, and the modernists, such as Joyce, Lawrence, Hemingway, Faulkner, and Beckett, among others.

**2201350 Business English (3 credit hours)**

The course aims at acquainting students with the language of business. It places special emphasis on company structure, meetings, job applications and interviews, telephoning, basic business writing, language of marketing, and business socializing.



**2201352 Modern World Literature (3 credit hours)**

**P.R.: 2201111 Introduction to English Literature**

Expanding the canon through emphasizing a balance between Western and non-Western literatures by examining a variety of modern literary works to consolidate the awareness regarding travels in modernity and post-modernity worldwide.

**2201353 English for Diplomatic Purposes (3 credit hours)**

The course introduces students to the UN bodies & organization: structure and operating mechanism. It also familiarizes students with terms and expression used in diplomatic texts and correspondence through relevant texts and activities.

**2201354 English for Tourism and Hotel Industry (3 credit hours)**

The course focuses on different areas of the tourism sector and hotel industry with the aim of providing students with basic vocabulary and jargon that are most often used. Topics include travel programs, types of offers, travel contracts, transportation, providing information on topics of interest to tourists, writing tourism brochures, describing hotel facilities, dealing with complaints, making and confirming reservations, and organizing tours, and excursions. The ultimate goal is developing students' ability to respond quickly, fluently, and politely in high-pressure situations.

**2201356 English for Journalism (3 credit hours)**

The course aims at training students to produce audio, visual, and cyber media reports. It also develops their skills in listening to and monitoring news bulletins and reading mainstream newspapers. Moreover, it promotes their skills in conducting interviews, in addition to reporting and editing news.

**2201361 Translation I (English – Arabic) (3 credit hours)**

This course Trains students to translate various types of texts from English into idiomatic Arabic. Students will be presented with different text types ranging from texts of a general nature to those which are more specialized. In addition to the effective techniques of translation, students will learn how to consider other important elements pertaining to structural relations and contextuality.

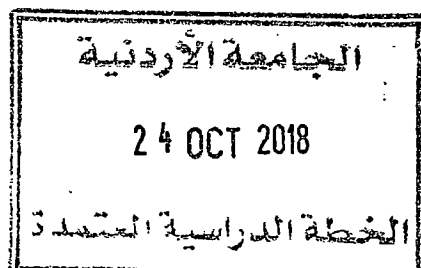
**2201362 Translation II (Arabic – English) (3 credit hours)**

This course builds on students' learning experiences in Translation I. It prepares students to translate longer texts of various types from Arabic into English, while highlighting the basic problems facing Arab learners of English translation. Aspects of text analysis, sentential and structural relations together with the importance of context in translation must be emphasized in this course.

**2201444 Translation of Commercial & Economic Texts (3 credit hours)**

**P.R.: 2201361 Translation I (English – Arabic)**

The course trains students to translate from English into Arabic and vice versa a variety of texts in the fields of finance, banking, investment, stock markets, and governance.



**2201456 Writing for Public Relations**

**(3 credit hours)**

**P.R: 2201114 Writing**

The course introduces students to the concepts of mission and vision statement, methods of drafting organizational goals and objectives. It also trains students to prepare PR programs, press releases, ad copy, releases for radio and television, PR letters, and brochures, organize funding appeals, and other internal projects designed to help organizations.
